Beach Report

While summer is not officially over this year until September 23, it is certainly winding down. One of my fondest summer memories is helping two of my young grandchildren learn to kayak at the Beach. The children, ages 5 and 7, took turns in a small 7 foot kayak. The shallow, gradual slope of the shore allows a grown-up to walk along in the water, offering some guidance and encouragement. We all enjoyed the fun in the water, and the children impressed themselves with their developing skills!

Professionals from the Anne Arundel County Department of Health sample the water at the Beach biweekly, and post the numerical value for the number of enterococci colony forming units (CFU) per 100 milliliters of water sample. The highest value reported this summer was 14 CFU/100 mL, well below the maximum acceptable level of 104. Sampling is a very transient snapshot of that particular spot in the water column, at that particular moment. The samplers strive to obtain a representative sample. The sampling data is reported at the Health Department website: https://aahealth.org/environmental-health/recreational-water-quality/water-quality-report#southriver

Unfortunately, the children's picnic table in the east playground was severely damaged by vandalism in mid-August. It appeared the table had been jumped on repeatedly until the top broke off. The top was bowed, and the bolts which once attached the top were sheared off. A dedicated volunteer, Phil Jones, was able to salvage the top and repair the table. We are very grateful, as this table is a favorite with the young children.

Volunteers have donated hundreds of hours performing precision cutting of phragmites in the eastern natural shoreline over the past two years. Formerly this area was a near monoculture of phragmites. Now it is a haven for native vegetation and provides vital habitat for native wildlife. The project has earned praise from Anne Arundel County, and has been used as an example of a successful strategy for combating phragmites. Naturally, the area needs ongoing maintenance. Welspryng is under contract to do this precision cutting in the area. The company is expected to perform a cutting within the first few days of September. It will then be doing at least one more cutting this growing season, in late October or November. Welspryng is also under contract to maintain the vegetation in the central swale according to best management practices. Reportedly, there is no contract to maintain the vegetation of the natural shoreline at the river end of the central swale, to the east of the open swim area.

Our trees at the Beach contribute beauty, shade, and a host of watershed benefits. However, the trees experience difficult living conditions, such as high winds and saltwater intrusion into the ground water. They need all the help we can give them. An arborist has nourished the landscape tress, and several trees have been pruned to remove dead branches and promote good form. In order to protect them, trees have been mulched. Volunteers have regularly carried water to irrigate several struggling trees to relieve their stress. This has been a very dry year so far. We are currently more than 10 inches behind in rainfall.

As we say goodbye to summer, I offer my sincere thanks to our volunteers for their many efforts irrigating, fixing equipment, weeding and cutting phragmites.

Here's hoping September brings many summer-like days to enjoy our Beach.

HSIA Building Permits

A HSIA Building Permit is required every time an Anne Arundel County Building Permit is issued for any work done at your property? The responsibility of obtaining an HSIA Building Permit falls on the owner, not the contractor.

Why does HSIA require and issue building permits? Per HSIA Covenants & Deed Restrictions, HSIA's sideline setbacks (15') are different from the County (7'). We encourage anyone having work done at their property to reach out to the HSIA Building Permit Chair before designing your structure or applying to the County. Failure to obtain a HSIA Building Permit prior to the start of construction will result in a stop work order.

The fee for an HSIA Building Permit is \$25. The following items are required to obtain a HSIA Building Permit:

- 1. A copy of the Anne Arundel County Building Permit.*
- 2. A TO SCALE copy of the site plan.*
- 3. A copy of the plans and elevations, TO SCALE, of the structure. *
- 4. Cash or check in the amount of \$25., made payable to HSIA
- 5. Mail all required items & payment to HSIA, PO BOX 3485, Annapolis MD 21403
- 6. Provide current mailing address, as your HSIA Building Permit will be mailed via USPS *AN EMAILED PDF OF THE COUNTY PERMIT AND THE TO-SCALE SITE and/or STRUCTURE PLAN IS PREFERRED AND MAY EXPEDITE THE PROCESS OF OBTAINING A HSIA BUILDING PERMIT.

<u>HSIA Covenants & Deed Restrictions</u>, recorded among the Land Record of Anne Arundel County, Maryland in Liber 900, Folio 334, are binding as a matter of law and are for the benefit of all other lot owners in Hillsmere.

Anne Arundel County Code, 2005, Article 18, Zoning, Title 2, General Provisions, Subtitle 3, Setbacks

For permit approval, please allow 10 working days to receive your permit in order to allow time to make sure all of your documents are legible (do not take photos of documents and email them), review it, verify your request meets HSIA Covenants and setbacks, and contact you for any questions on the submission. Please provide your current mailing address if it is different than the address on the AA County Building Permit. Your permit will also be mailed, via USPS, which takes several days.

If you have any questions on the setbacks feel free to ask before you go to the trouble of getting a County permit and find you cannot get an HSIA permit. When in doubt, or, if you have any questions, contact HSIA Building Permit Chairman via email, permits@hillsmereshores.org, or voice mail, 410-263-4456.

We'll work on a schedule of events to present to the Board for approval and funding. The final schedule will be posted in the January or February 2024 newsletter.





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

The Chesapeake Conservancy is buying a building on West Street near the library and will not be building in QWP.

GRANT FUNDING AWARDED!

Sand Spit Living Shoreline/Coastal Resiliency Project

Great news to report! On September 1, 2023, Maryland Department of Natural Resources ("DNR") officially awarded \$669,191 to the Arundel Rivers Federation ("Federation") for the Hillsmere Sand Spit Shoreline Restoration project, culminating several years of effort by HSIA and the Federation to obtain funding for the Sand Spit Living Shoreline project.

Earlier, on July 31, 2023, DNR announced the intended award of more than \$3 million in competitive grants for 13 climate resiliency projects throughout the State, including the Hillsmere Sand Spit Living Shoreline project, to help communities design and construct solutions to withstand flooding and other weather-related events. Since funding for these 13 projects is provided by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA"), and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration ("NOAA"), official award of the grants was delayed pending final approval by the federal partners. And now, as of September 1, it is official!

DNR's announcement was for a grant to "Arundel Rivers Federation – To construct a living shore-line along the Hillsmere Sand Spit and install conservation plantings to increase climate resilience of a community marina."

And of note to Hillsmere residents as well, DNR also announced a grant to "The Key School – To design and construct three bioretention practices to address stormwater flooding on school fields and erosion of the adjacent community shoreline." Together, these grants represent a win-win for Hillsmere!

The next hurdle in the process is obtaining a Joint Federal/State Wetlands Permit for the project. As previously reported, our design contractor Environmental Systems Analysis ("ESA"), along with Federation and HSIA representatives have been meeting with DNR officials and Maryland Department of Environment ("MDE") representatives, incorporating their comments and making minor revisions to the Sand Spit Living Project plans prior to submitting the joint federal/state permit application for the Project. The application is now set to be submitted the first week of September, starting what could be a year-long approval process.

Marina Security Camera System

As reported earlier, camera system work was proceeding slowly due to installation crew illness and injury, and high tides that hamper under-dock conduit installation. Work has now resumed and will hopefully be completed this month. Overseeing this installation, Mike Waters reports that the work thus far appears to be very good quality.

When the system is operational, access to the Wi-Fi signal will initially be limited to slip holders, at no additional cost, and be password protected. After a test period, depending on test results and available bandwidth, access may be made open to the public. Camera feed may be made accessible to slip holders as well as HSIA Security, and will be password protected.

Wait Lists

Wait Lists have become problematic. For example, although there are 41 names on the Slip Wait List for one of our 123 slips, easily half to two-thirds of them repeatedly decline a slip or simply do not respond to offers. There are an additional 23 names on the Lift Slip Wait List, and another 26 names on the Inactive Slip Wait List. For the 26 names on the Boat Park Wait List for one of 45 spaces, 20 either declined or did not respond to offers of spots in the Boat Park.

The P&H Committee has recommended to the HSIA Board that starting in 2024, the cost to get on the active Slip Wait Lists be raised from \$100 to \$250. Those already on the active lists who wish to remain active will be required to pay an additional \$150, or be moved to the Inactive List. Those currently on the Inactive List who wish to return to the active list will also be required to pay an additional \$150.

The P&H Committee further recommended that rather than the current rule of being allowed to refuse three (3) slip offers before being moved to the bottom of the Wait List, starting in 2024 refusal of two (2) slip offers or failure to respond to two (2) offers will result in being moved to the Inactive List.

For the Boat Park Wait List, the recommendation is to purge the list annually, requiring residents to sign up every year to get on the Boat Park Wait List.

Hurricane Season

Do you have a Hurricane Plan?

The HSIA Marina is extremely vulnerable to wind, storm surge and wave action. If a Tropical Storm or Hurricane Warning is issued for this area (generally 36 hours in advance), the best thing to do is to remove your boat from the Marina, by having it trailered, hauled, or moved to safer moorings or hurricane holes.

If you are out of town or otherwise unavailable during hurricane season, it is very important that you have someone local designated to take care of your boat.

Please make sure their contact information has been provided to the Chair of Piers & Harbors! (marina@hillsmereshores.org). Pay close attention to tropical storm forecasts, be proactive, and be ready to move your boat to safety.

Kayaks, paddleboards and canoes are vulnerable, too, and should be tied down and secured, or removed to your yard or garage, or another safer place.

If you decide to have your boat ride out a storm at the Marina, take appropriate steps to secure your boat and protect the Marina by rigging extra lines, doubling up mooring lines and placing protective fenders. Boat owners are solely and completely responsible for securing their boats if left in the Marina during a tropical storm or hurricane. Note that all power and water will be shut off at the Marina and boat ramps during tropical storms and hurricanes.

SLIP HOLDERS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR AND ASSUME FULL AND SOLE RISK OF DAMAGE TO THEIR BOATS AND THEIR EQUIPMENT, THE BOATS AND EQUIPMENT OF OTHERS, AND THE HSIA PIERS AND DOCKS AS A RESULT OF LEAVING THEIR BOATS IN THE MARINA DURING A TROPICAL STORM OR HURRICANE.

- · Marina driveway hedges were trimmed, and an emerging driveway pothole was patched.
- · Phragmites were removed from the shorelines of the Boat Park, Kayak Ramp and Sunset Ramp
- · Work has yet to resume on local slip improvements (line hangers, piling caps, guide lines).
- The required hydrostatic test of the standpipe system has been scheduled by Heidler Plumbing to take place on September 6, 2023.

Routine maintenance has continued as needed. If you see any damage, deficiencies, inoperable equipment or something that needs repair, like loose dock boards, torn piling caps, broken fixtures, leaking faucets, etc. Please let us know. New Boat Lift Installation Scheduled
